HOLDING ONTO HOME

Graham's journey was not defined by dementia, but by his resilience, his family's love, and a community committed to honouring his wishes.

The walls of a home hold more than just memories: they cradle our sense of identity, comfort, and independence. For Graham, an 82-year-old gentle man navigating the complex landscape of dementia, his modest residence became a sanctuary of dignity and love.

Diagnosed with dementia seven years ago, Graham was determined to maintain his independence. A single man living alone, he faced the progressive challenges of his condition with remarkable courage. His two adult children understood his deepest wish: to remain in the familiar embrace of his own home for as long as possible.

Co.As.It. would become Graham's lifeline. Working in close partnership with his family, they crafted a nuanced care strategy that evolved alongside Graham's changing needs. As his dementia slowly reshaped his world, the nursing and other home support teams dynamically adjusted their approach, increasing in-home and nursing care to match his declining health.

Graham's journey was not without obstacles. Frequent falls and hospital admissions punctuated his days, each setback met with unwavering medical attention. Our nursing teams would carefully monitor his condition, tenderly healing his wounds and restoring his strength. For seven remarkable years, Graham defied the typical trajectory of his diagnosis. He continued to live in the home where he had built a lifetime of memories, surrounded by caregivers who saw beyond his medical condition to the human being within.

Ultimately, after years of dedicated care, Graham's condition necessitated hospital admission. While the ideal scenario would have been for him to spend his final days at home, this wasn't possible any longer.

His family found solace in the quality of life he had maintained. They expressed deep gratitude for the compassionate staff from Co.As.It. who had supported Graham's independence and dignity.

His story reminds us that perfection isn't measured by flawless outcomes, but by the moments of connection, care, and respect along the way. Graham's journey was not defined by dementia, but by his resilience, his family's love, and a community committed to honouring his wishes.

Not every story has a picture-perfect ending, but each one is rich with victories—small and profound—that illuminate the human spirit's remarkable capacity to adapt, support, and love.



Allied HEALTH

STUDENT'S HANDS-ON EXPERIENCE

A significant part of the assessment focused on the bathroom - a space that poses safety risks for many people.

Our Co.As.It. Allied Health Team has been able to support two students this year, including Tatyana, a valued team member working part-time as a domestic assistance worker who has started a Certificate IV Allied Heath Assistance.

As part of this course, Tatyana must complete 120 hours of clinical placement, and the Allied Health team has been excited to be able to provide the placement at Co.As.lt.

Tatyana has spent time shadowing both physiotherapists and occupational therapists, in the community and at Amici House.

One of our experienced occupational therapists, Keelan, highlighted the benefits of students having 'real-life' experiences.

When Tatyana first observed an occupational therapist (OT) during an initial assessment, she was not sure what to expect. While she had some idea about what OTs do, seeing the process firsthand gave her a much clearer understanding of their work and its impact on lives.

The day began with a visit to a client's home, where the OT focused on understanding the client's daily routine and any challenges they were experiencing. Tatyana watched as the OT asked questions about the client's health and activities, aiming to identify areas where assistive devices or home modifications could improve safety and independence.

A significant part of the assessment focused on the bathroom—a space that poses safety risks for many people. The OT explained that the goal was to increase the client's independence with toileting and showering while reducing their risk of falls.

Tatyana assisted by taking measurements for modifications. She saw how these simple but carefully planned changes could make a meaningful difference in helping the client move around more confidently and perform daily tasks more independently.

Beyond the practical aspects, Tatyana learned how important it is to connect with clients on a personal level.



During the visit, she chatted with the client, helping them feel comfortable and at ease. Her friendly approach made the interaction more relaxed, and the client seemed to appreciate the care and attention given to their needs.

By the end of the day, Tatyana had a much deeper appreciation for the role of OTs. She saw how their work goes beyond recommending equipment—it's about empowering people to live independently and safely in their homes.

The experience also showed her how even small contributions, like assisting with measurements or building rapport with clients, can play a part in improving someone's quality of life.

Tatyana left the experience gaining valuable insight into a profession dedicated to making everyday life safer, easier, and more comfortable for those who need it most.

KICKING OSTEOGENESIS IMPERFECTA TO THE KERB

In a world that often underestimates the power of resilience, Roslyn stands as proof of hope and determination. Living with osteogenesis imperfecta (OI), a genetic condition that makes bones as fragile as glass, she has weathered over 100 fractures—a number that would break most spirits, but not hers.

A Life of Challenges, A Heart of Courage

Imagine a body where each step could potentially lead to a fracture, where hearing is a challenge, and where muscles and joints constantly remind you of your limitations. This has been Roslyn's reality. Yet, instead of surrendering to her condition, she has chosen to dance with adversity.

Supported by her devoted husband and empowered by NDIS funding, Roslyn has transformed her challenges into opportunities for creativity and personal growth. Her days are now filled with artistic pursuits that highlight her resolute spirit—crocheting intricate rugs, creating sparkling diamond dot artworks, painting by numbers, and crafting personalised cards.

Breaking Barriers, Not Bones

The NDIS has been a game-changer for Roslyn. Her home is now decked out with adaptive living aids.

She is now enjoying using a purpose-built ensuite bathroom; a Revolution dining chair that allows her to share meals with loved ones; walkers and walking sticks; an electric recliner and adjustable bed and an iPad for online learning, including lip-reading courses.

Roslyn's most remarkable transformation has been physical. Her unwavering commitment to her exercise program has yielded incredible results. Where once walking was a monumental challenge, she now navigates steps with increasing confidence. Her improved gait and ability to pick up objects from the floor are victories hard-won through persistence and professional support.

Inspiration and Resilience

Roslyn embodies the true meaning of strength. She demonstrates that disability is not inability, that limitations are often just opportunities in disguise. Her story is a powerful reminder that with the right support, an unyielding spirit, and a positive attitude, remarkable transformations are possible.

In a world that often celebrates physical perfection across a wide range of tableaus, Roslyn teaches us a more profound lesson: true strength lies not in an unblemished body, but in an unbreakable spirit.

The program focuses on individual needs but also offers community connections support to assist people to connect with services and live more independently. "I really appreciate all of the support Co.As.It. provides through its QCSS program,' Mary said. 'It means I can now focus on spending more quality time with my family to go on social outings together and attend our local Catholic church. I also love preparing traditional Middle Eastern food – kebabs and baklava – for my family."

With the loving support of family, who all live nearby, Mary is now enthusiastically enjoying activities in her neighbourhood but she yearns to see her twin four-year-old grandchildren who live in Lebanon.

While we hope that her dream is soon a reality, we will continue to support her as she settles into her much-loved new country.

The economic benefit of volunteers during the year 2022/2023 was valued at \$117.8 billion

In recognition of the willingness of volunteers to give of their time, skills and support, Governor of Queensland, Her Excellency the Honourable Dr Jeannette Young held a morning tea at Government House in early December.

The event was to celebrate International Volunteer Day and the vital role volunteers play in communities across the world.

Attended by our ACVVS Coordinators this formal recognition of the value of our volunteers was a gratifying way of celebrating the enormous impact volunteers have on society in general.

A recent study done by Volunteering Queensland identified that in Queensland, the economic benefit of volunteers during the year 2022/2023 was valued at \$117.8 billion.

An estimated 64.3% of Queenslanders (2,800,000 people) aged 15 years and over contributed to our community on a multitude of fronts, not only impacting positively on the those they assisted, but also on the country's GDP. *

The study also identified that if the work done by volunteers Queensland-wide was to be reimbursed as a salary, the state would need to find \$31.3 billion per year in wages.

"Comparing the costs to the benefits, Queensland's volunteering is estimated to return a benefit of \$4.70 for every \$1 of cost." *

In our increasingly technical and digital arena, the ability to connect on a face-to-face and human level is both a gift and a prize.

For many organisations and auspices, the event was a delightful acknowledgement and appreciation of the work carried out in promoting and implementing human contact for olde rpeople in our community.

PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY INTO VOLUNTEERING

The enquiry is calling for public submissions around creating an effective volunteering ecosystem.

In further acknowledgement of volunteers, on 11 December, Co.As.It. CEO Tanina Softa and one of our ACVVS Coordinators attended Queensland Parliament House for the launch of a Parliamentary Inquiry into Volunteering, hosted by the Honourable Ann Leahy MP, Minister for Volunteers.

The inquiry aims to increase an understanding of volunteering in Queensland communities, increase participation rates and improve opportunities for volunteering whilst also increasing awareness and understanding of volunteering and its central importance to all Queensland communities.

The inquiry is also calling for public submissions around creating an effective volunteering ecosystem and producing recommendations that will increase and improve opportunities for the volunteering workforce.

The closing date for submissions is 28 February 2025 and the Parliamentary Committee report is due 18 September 2025.

In social situations all around the world, music is supremely important, a universal language, combining melody, harmony and messages.

It also plays a supportive role for our Co.As.It. CIAO initiative which bridges the gap between daily recreational activities in residential aged care homes and Italian residents.

Italian residents at Rockpool always delight in musical performances by piano accordionist, Fausto, who with his piano accordion and singing voice, always lights up the atmosphere with everyone joining in – joyously dancing, singing along or enthusiastically applauding.

When Rockpool resident Anna listened to Fausto perform, the joy was apparent in her beaming smile, as she remarked, 'I love this, it makes me feel young and alive'.

Positive processes occur in our brains when we listen to music or play together, tapping into our emotions, often evoking cheerfulness, happiness and contentment.

Activity officers of the CIAO Program know this, having found Italian residents rank music almost on par with coffee and food, and for an Italian that says a lot!



Another popular feature of the CIAO initiative is fun-filled interactive activities that delight auditory, olfactory and visual senses for the residents.

Activities also create moments of glee, like competitive games where a balloon is hammered by foam batons whilst residents try to keep it afloat!.

When Lucy at Portofino joins in, she does so with both energy and joy: 'I'm very determined to hit that balloon and get my exercise for the day!'

This simple activity strengthens hand and eye coordination, while promoting engagement with one another through play and laughter - and the players are fiercely competitive!

UNSINKABLE BUOYANCY

Denis has had a rough year this year, almost becoming homeless, he spent over four months in hospital with a very bad break to his leg after an accident.

He had no support services in place to assist him once he went home. We collaborated with another provider, ensuring Denis received home support from us when he returned home, while they concentrated on finding him accommodation.

A short time after he was discharged, Denis was rushed to hospital via ambulance. Experiencing a lot of pain, a diagnosis of cancer soon required him to start chemo and radium treatment five times a week for five weeks.

Being the trooper that Denis is, he took it on the chin and with collaboration between his other organisation and Co.As.It., he was able to get to his daily treatments which are now thankfully completed.

Putting services in place for Denis was no easy task, Denis is a very independent man used to independence in all daily living tasks, and driving on his own.

Denis accepted weekly assistance with Personal Care, fortnightly Social Support and weekly physio to assist him get back on the road to recovery and achieve his goal of driving again. Strength does not come from physical capacity. It comes from an indomitable will. (Mahatma Ghandi)

Denis received one of the Co.As.It. Christmas Hampers right before his last treatment and you couldn't wipe the smile from his face. He said he felt "pretty good" and was genuinely thankful for the hamper.

He has faced life's challenges with an unwavering resolve: health scares, tragedies of losing loved ones, and beating alcoholism.

Denis has celebrated 42 years of sobriety of which he is intensely proud. He still attends AA services, supporting others and inspiring them with his success story.

We hope to be helping Denis stay at home for as long as possible and seeing his indomitable spirit, we don't have any doubts that this will be easily achieved!

John had only joined our Home Care Package program recently and since then, we have made it a priority to support John's quest for independence. Having learned to walk with one prosthetic leg, after spending substantial time in hospital and rehabilitation, John looks forward to receiving his second prosthetic in the future. Whilst waiting for this to happen, he made plans about being mobile in the interim.

Just prior to Christmas last year, after waiting for ages for overseas parts, a life-changing breakthrough was John receiving the keys to a modified mobility scooter.

This means John can now scoot about independently without having to rely on his wife. With independent mobility, a new exciting chapter has begun for John and his wife and grateful for support from us, this couple is back to enjoying life.

Ora, Joanne fa di più che partecipare agli incontri. Accoglie nuovi membri, il suo percorso di recupero sta diventando un esempio di speranza per gli altri che affrontano sfide simili. La sua presenza sussurra un messaggio potente: la guarigione è possibile e tu sei più forte del tuo dolore.

SHE LEFT - AT 80 YRS OF AGE!

Domestic violence is a pattern of abusive behaviour in any relationship that is used by one partner to gain or maintain power and control over a nother person, this could be a partner, family member, aged person or freind.

Domestic violence can be physical, sexual, emotional, financial or psychological actions or threats of actions that influence or exert coercive control over another person.

That is why Maria's story (not her real name) is so much more incredible because at the age of almost 80, she had the courage to end the cycle of abuse and stand up for her own right to live freely.

Control and domestic violence are embodied by silence, silence from those that suffer, silence from those around them, and silence from those who perpetrate abuse.

This silence leaves women in isolation carrying the burden of embarrassment, humiliation and mortification. It stops them from speaking out about the abuse and precludes them from getting help, often with serious consequences.

That is why Maria's action is incredibly brave. In front of her children, she suffered years of abuse from her husband, including numerous bashings (resulting in brain injury), coercive and financial control.

Then one day he was admitted to hospital for an extended period of time and without the perpetrator controlling and abusing her, she discovered a world where she did not have to ask permission for anything, nor put up with his abuse.

After her husband returned from hospital, her life resumed as before. However Maria had tasted freedom and relished it. She did something profoundly difficult, setting a course of action in place to retain her independence.

She called some family members to set up supports and once she had done so she took her plan to the next level. Giving her husband an innocent excuse she said 'I am going to the shops to buy sugar'. She then left, went to stay with her brother in another state and never went back!

A report for Domestic Violence was filed with the police. A social Worker helped Maria to overcome the anxiety, fear and apprehension she suffered whilst we supprted her during this difficult transition.

Maria left with just the clothes on her back but she is living well on her pension, and without her husband controlling her money, she is finally enjoying a new wardrobe!

With the support of Co.As.It.'s social worker, Maria is now learning and implementing healthier coping mechanisms. 'God has been on my side' she said.

Well done Maria! You are an example and an inspiration for people of all ages.

In March 2020 at the Women of the World Festival, HRH the Duchess of Cornwall stated that the survivors of coercive control and domestic violence are some of the bravest people she has ever met. Imagine having th courage to remove oneself from that situation at almost 80 years of age!

According to Mark Groves (National Centre for Domestic Violence), domestic abuse will never end until we make it socially unacceptable. It is up to us as family members, friends and colleagues to help say 'NO".

We hope that Maria's story will inspire many other people living with domestic violence to seek support and help. We are here to support you.

BACK TO SCHOOL AT COOMBABAH STATE HIGH SCHOOL

What makes this exchange truly special is its authenticity. Students see beyond the stereotypes of ageing, recognising wisdom and vibrant personalities. The elder visitors rediscover the energy of youth, their own memories refreshed by young perspectives.

By lunch at Dublin Docks Tavern, something has changed. They're no longer strangers or categories (students and elders, young and old).

They're simply people, connected by shared human experiences, by curiosity, by the beautiful complexity of cultural identity.





The most exciting part? This isn't an ending, but a beginning. This is the third time we have combined the generations, now with plans for the students to visit Co.As.lt.'s Social Group Activity centre.

The cultural exchange promises to continue growing, deepening understanding with each shared moment.

IMMERSION PROGRAM QUEENSLAND SCHOOLS

Two dedicated teams, (Brisbane and Sunshine Coast)work tirelessly throughout the year supporting Italian programs by facilitating in-school immersion experiences as well as providing teaching resources upon request.

From classrooms to consular visits, every moment has been a step towards fostering a love for Italian teaching and learning. ILC is excited to continue the journey of promoting Italian language and culture at schools throughout Queensland.

Italian Christmas at St. Columba's Primary School: Year 1 and Year 2 students enjoyed an introduction to Italian Christmas traditions. They were amazed to learn that children in Italy receive gifts from both Babbo Natale (Santa's Italian "colleague") and a lovely old lady called La Befana who delivers coal instead of gifts to naughty children.

Demystifying the Imperfetto verb tense at All Hallows' School:

Year 10 students engaed in an ILC Italian in-school session with the focus on demystifying one of the more challenging verb tenses: the Imperfetto. Students were encouraged to think of it as a tense that sets a scene, evokes memories and captures the rhythm of past habits. the correct use of the Imperfetto tense was effortlessly reinforced.

Italian through sport at St Joseph's Nundah: Year 3 and Year 4 students enjoyed a lively cultural immersion lesson which began with an interactive presentation introducing vocabulary related to Italy's most beloved sports: IL CALCIO (soccer), IL CICLISMO (cycling); L'AUTOMOBILISMO (car racing); IL MOTOCICLISMO (motorbike racing); IL TENNIS. At the end of the session, students were able to express their sports preferences in Italian and were confident enough to actively engage in IL GIOCO DEI MIMI (miming game) to reinforce the vocabulary learnt throughout the session.


